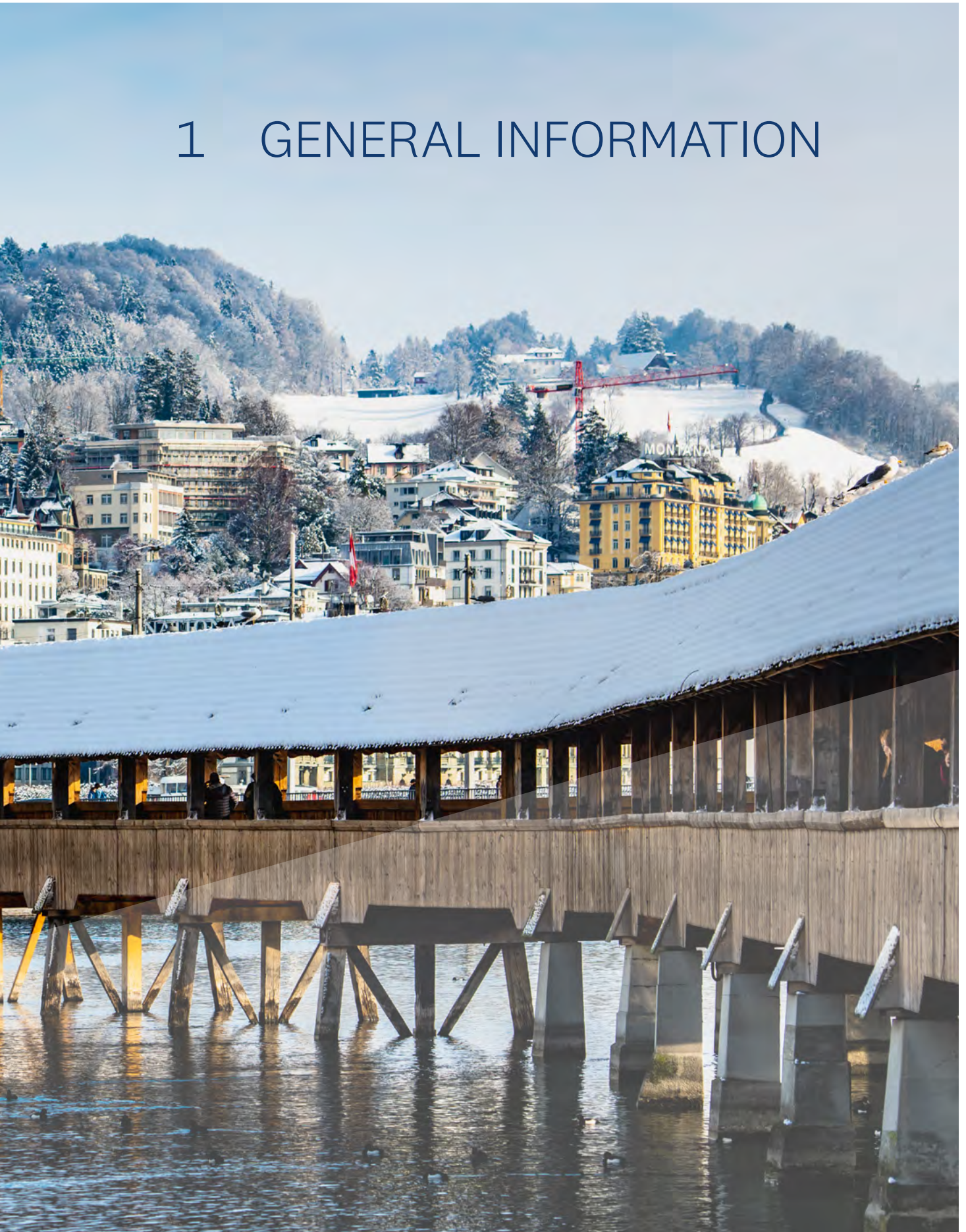

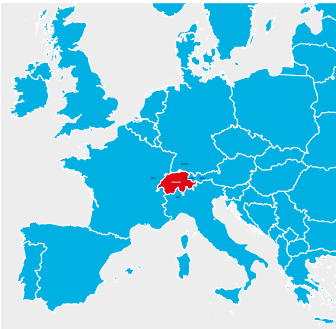


1 GENERAL INFORMATION



1.1 The Host Country: Switzerland

Switzerland is located in the heart of Europe. It borders Germany to the north, Austria and Liechtenstein to the east, Italy to the south and France to the west. Its population of 9 million live mostly on the plateau, between the Jura and Alpine ranges. Four official languages are spoken in Switzerland. Switzerland is where tradition and modernity come together. Its innovative research and economic landscape is as much a part of its identity as its breath-taking natural scenery, including picturesque lakes and majestic mountain peaks.

1.1.1 History and National Flag

Switzerland developed over the centuries from a collection of different alliances to a confederation of states and finally to the federal state we know today. Its national borders and neutrality were established and recognised internationally in 1815. Its political system dates back to the Federal Constitution of 1848. Since then, the powers of the federal government, political rights and political diversity have increased significantly.



Since the 14th century, a white cross on a red background has been the insignia of Swiss soldiers. When Switzerland's federal constitution was adopted in 1848, the white cross in a red square became the country's official national flag. Its square shape distinguishes it from other flags. Thanks to its symmetry, it is impossible to hang it the wrong way round. On ships, however, the flag may also be rectangular. The colour, shape and rules governing its use are defined in a 90-page set of regulations.

Switzerland is a neutral country with worldwide connections: it has ties with the European Union through a network of bilateral agreements, and it is a member of the United Nations and other international organizations. Experts and politicians from around the world meet in Geneva to work together internationally.

On 9 June 2022, the UN General Assembly elected Switzerland as a non-permanent member of the UN Security Council. Switzerland's non-permanent 2023-24 seat furthers the country's commitment to peace and security within the UN and globally.

1.1.2 Political System and Federalism

The Swiss Confederation is a federal state, comprising 26 partially sovereign cantons and 2131 communes. What unites Switzerland is neither a common language, nor a shared religion or ethnic origin, but rather its system of direct democracy, strong federalism and enduring neutrality. This is why Switzerland is known as a 'Willensnation' – a nation brought together by the will of its people.

Every four years the Federal Assembly (the National Council and Council of States) convenes to appoint the seven federal councillors who together form the federal government. One of these federal councillors is elected to serve as president for a term of one year. The federal government is based on a multi-party system; to reach decisions, its members must be willing to compromise. As a result, political decision-making in the Federal Council takes some time, but ensures a high level of acceptance and continuity.

The Swiss people not only elect the members of their two chambers – the National Council and Council of States – but also decide on political issues up to four times a year. Votes are held on popular initiatives and on certain parliamentary decisions, in most cases having to do with constitutional or legislative amendments.

1.1.3 Population and Society

Switzerland is a multilingual country. The four national languages are German, French, Italian and Romansh. 62 per cent of the population primarily speak (Swiss-) German, 23 per cent French, 8 per cent Italian and 0,5 per cent Romansh. Many people state that they have two main languages, i. e., they are bilingual.

There are 9,04 million people living in Switzerland, about a quarter of them without a Swiss passport. More than half of these foreign nationals were either born in Switzerland or have been living here for at least ten years. The majority of the foreign population comes from an EU country.

Switzerland's population is predominantly urban, with three-quarters living in towns and cities. There are no large cities in Switzerland with more than one million inhabitants, but most people live in urban areas, with the vast majority of the population living in the city centres and their surrounding areas.

Switzerland is a Christian country. 63% of its population are either Catholic or Protestant (Reformed Evangelical). Freedom of religion in Switzerland also allows other religious communities to practise such faiths as Judaism, Islam and Buddhism.



1.1.4 Geography and Climate

Switzerland lies at the heart of Europe. It has three distinct geographical regions: the Alps, the Central Plateau and the Jura. The country boasts an extraordinary variety of landscapes and habitats.

Mountains cover more than half of Switzerland but only a quarter of the population lives there. The Jura is also scarcely populated, and much of the region is covered by forest and agricultural land. The Central Plateau has the highest concentration of urban areas. Although these areas cover only one quarter of the country, they are home to the majority of the population. With thousands of lakes and rivers, Switzerland is a water-rich country. It is also referred to as the reservoir of Europe' due to the fact that it has roughly 6% of the continent's freshwater reserves.

Switzerland has four distinct seasons. Its varied topography and elevations make it a country of microclimates. Temperatures are conditioned by altitude and vary considerably in Switzerland. Starting at an altitude of 1200–1500 metres, precipitation during winter predominantly falls as snow, such that a solid layer of snow often covers this area for weeks, and even months at higher altitudes. The average temperature on the Central Plateau in March is around 5°C while the temperatures in the mountain regions are usually below 0°C.

1.1.5 Sporting Events in Switzerland

At the international level, Switzerland is known as a nation of sports enthusiasts. With the International Olympic Committee (IOC) and the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS) in Lausanne, the World Football Association (FIFA) and the International Ice Hockey Federation (IIHF) in Zurich, the International Cycling Union (UCI) in Aigle and the International Ski Federation (FIS) in Oberhofen on Lake Thun, Switzerland has its finger on the pulse of global sporting events.



Switzerland has a long tradition of winter sports. Skiing and cross-country skiing are among the most popular winter leisure activities. Thanks to its geographical location, which offers not only fantastic competition venues but also generally good snow, Switzerland is predestined to host winter sports events. The country hosts the world's elite in winter sports at the World Cup races in Wengen, Adelboden, but also in St. Moritz and Crans-Montana. The cross-country skiing World Cup events in Davos and Goms are highlights of the FIS calendar. In addition, Switzerland has already successfully hosted numerous other large-scale sporting events, such as the IFSC Climbing & Paraclimbing World Championships 2023 in Bern. Sport in Switzerland benefits from first-class venues, an effective promotion of young talent – and a hugely enthusiastic population.

In 2025, Switzerland will host several major sporting events with the IBU Biathlon World Championships, the FIS Freestyle World Ski Championships and the UEFA Women's EURO. The 5th CISM Military World Winter Games will benefit from Switzerland's extensive experience and the insights it has gained hosting these other major sporting events.

1.1.6 Swiss Armed Forces

The Swiss Armed Forces are part of the Federal Department of Defence, Civil Protection and Sport (DDPS). In Switzerland, military service is compulsory for male citizens, female citizens can serve in the military on a voluntary basis. The armed forces' target number of troops is 100 000 soldiers. In case these troops need to be mobilised, they can be equipped and ready for duty within 24 to 96 hours. It is the armed forces' constitutionally defined task to prevent war and defend the country. Another task is to offer subsidiary support to civilian authorities in special situations. The armed forces may also participate in international peace promotion efforts.

Since 1992, the Swiss Armed Forces have promoted sport at the highest level in a very targeted way and this support has gradually been expanded and improved. With the creation of a military basic training programme for elite athletes in 2004, the armed forces have become a central source of support for young Swiss athletes. The programme offers athletes the opportunity to coordinate their training and competition planning with their military service in an optimal way that is specific to their sport. In addition, a limited number of top athletes who show great potential for success are offered temporary employment contracts to work for the armed forces.



1.1.7 CISM Delegation Switzerland

Switzerland has been an active member of CISM since joining in 1968. In addition to regularly participating in competitions and filling important positions on CISM committees, the Swiss Armed Forces have already hosted 35 Military World Championships, as for example the 2008 CISM World Military Cross-Country Championships, and numerous regional competitions. In particular, the Swiss Armed Forces have organised successful large-scale events in winter sports disciplines such as the CISM Skiing World Championships in Andermatt in 1995 and 2006. In 2023, Switzerland became the first nation to host the CISM Military World Half-Marathon Championships in Lucerne. With 39 participating nations, this event was a large success and an excellent testing event for the Military World Winter Games.

Switzerland's close relationship with the CISM World Federation, its extensive experience in the organisation and staging of CISM competitions, and its strong belief in the CISM motto 'friendship through sport' are the roots of its motivation to host the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games.

1.2 The Host Region: Central Switzerland

Lucerne and the region of central Switzerland are excellent sites for hosting the Winter Games. The existing venues have already successfully hosted other competitions and offer excellent conditions in which athletes can perform at the highest level. In addition, the city of Lucerne provides a striking combination of urban charm and stunning mountain views. The 5th CISM Military World Winter Games can count on substantial support from the venues and sports associations involved.

With its impressive Alpine backdrop, the central Switzerland region offers not only modern competition facilities but also a comprehensive public transport network, short distances to venues and an ideal climate for all winter sports. For these reasons, central Switzerland and the City of Lucerne are virtually predestined to host a major sporting event like the Military World Winter Games.

In addition to the centrally located host city of Lucerne, which itself will also be the venue for certain events, the Games will be held primarily at two other locations in central Switzerland. Alpine disciplines such as skiing and snowboarding will find excellent pistes in the Engelberg-Titlis region, while the Andermatt and Goms regions offer outstanding conditions for Nordic disciplines and ski mountaineering.

1.2.1 Host City: Lucerne

Located in the heart of central Switzerland, the city of Lucerne is home to countless sights, a one-of-a-kind landscape along its crystal-clear lake, and exceptional mountain vistas. It is a city that combines the old and the new in equal measure: the picturesque traffic-free Old Town with its medieval Chapel Bridge contrasts beautifully with modern, innovative architecture such as that of the Culture and Congress Centre. An attractive range of leisure activities is just as much a part of Lucerne as the many nearby destinations on Mounts Rigi, Pilatus and Stanserhorn.

At 436 metres above sea level, Lucerne enjoys good weather conditions – which is one of the reasons this city is an ideal starting point for many on their travels through Switzerland. All destinations in and around Lucerne’s city centre are also easily accessible thanks to a dense public transport network. The region around Lucerne benefits from a close connection to winter sports with to state-of-the-art infrastructure and winter sports facilities not far from the city centre.



The Lucerne region has a population of about 220 000 – roughly 80 000 of whom live in the city. Its comprehensive range of educational opportunities including one cantonal university and several universities of applied sciences, its wealth of cultural events comprising a large number of concerts and other performances, and a wide-ranging sports landscape with over 150 active sports clubs make Lucerne the ideal city to host the Military World Winter Games. With its Lucerne Regatta and Top Athletics Lucerne events, the City of Lucerne already hosts two international sporting events at world-class level every year. The Swiss City Marathon is one of the largest running events in Switzerland with a stunning course in and around the city of Lucerne.

1.2.2 Alpine Sports Centre: Engelberg-Titlis

Engelberg-Titlis is one of the largest winter holiday destinations in central Switzerland. The monastery village with its 4600 inhabitants offers a wide range of activities and unforgettable mountain experiences. Unique and yet traditional, Engelberg lies 25 kilometres south of Lake Lucerne in a wide mountain valley at around 1000 metres above sea level. Founded in the 12th century, the Benedictine monastery shapes the village's everyday life to this day. Combined with the town's laid-back, traditionally Swiss flair, the monastery's distinctive archi-

ecture gives the village its own unique charm. Engelberg offers a very special atmosphere in the middle of a fascinating mountain range. Numerous visitors from all over the world are consistently delighted by the region's diverse winter activities and cultural offers.

The Titlis, a 3239-metre-high glacier mountain guarantees snow until well into spring. Winters are generally long in this region, beginning as early as October and lasting until May. Engelberg is known for its varied skiing and freeride terrain and has been named one of the top 10 ski areas in Switzerland. It invites visitors to ski, snowboard or go sledging, and there are 35 km of prepared cross-country ski trails.

Engelberg-Titlis hosts competitive Alpine events in a range of disciplines every year. The local sports clubs have a great deal of experience in planning and running winter sports events. The Organising Committee of the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games is therefore working closely with local sports clubs in accordance with the long-term strategy of the national ski association Swiss-Ski.





1.2.3 Nordic Sports Centre: Andermatt / Goms

Andermatt lies at the foot of the Saint-Gotthard Massif at 1447 metres above sea level. With a population of almost 1600, it is the largest of the three villages nestled in the Urseren valley. The region around Andermatt lies directly at the intersection of pass routes from north to south, and from west to east. Eight different passes can be accessed by passing through Andermatt – a fact that makes this village truly unique. The four springs of the rivers Rhine, Reuss, Rhone and Ticino have their source in the Saint-Gotthard Massif.

The holiday region of Andermatt is one of the most snow-sure winter sports resorts in Switzerland. Since 1969 it has regularly hosted international CISM competitions. Mountaineers and ski tourers can find numerous possible routes to take around Andermatt. Cross-country skiers can also enjoy the best snow conditions and an extensive network of cross-country trails. In the Urseren valley there are a total of 28 km of cross-country ski trails for both classic and skating

disciplines in a magnificent winter sports setting. In addition, the Andermatt-Sedrun ski arena is one of the largest and most modern ski areas in Switzerland, with over 120 kilometres of pistes and 22 lifts.

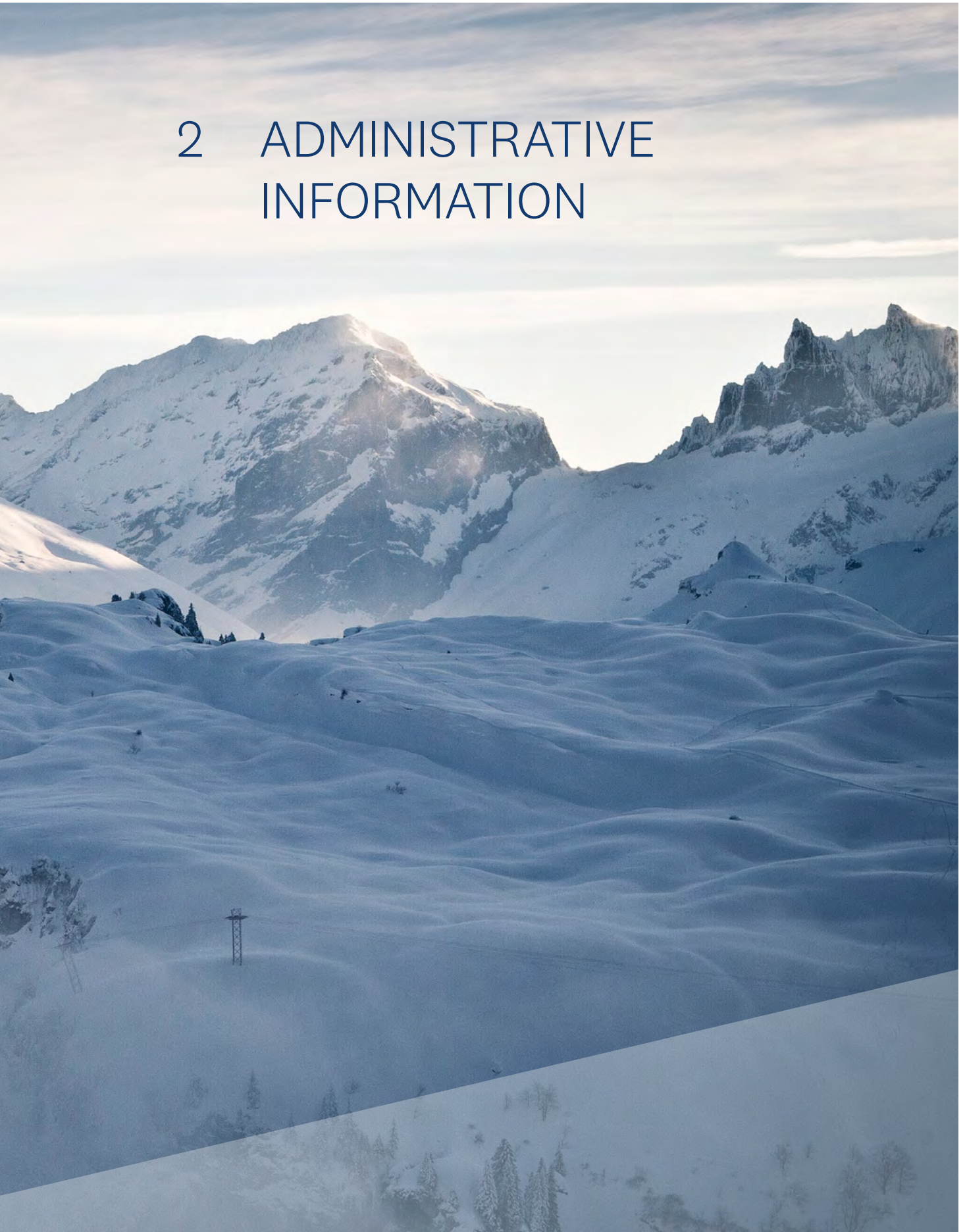
Directly connected by a railway tunnel with Andermatt, the sunny Upper Valais mountain valley of Goms is home to 4400 people. Goms lies along the route of the famous Glacier Express – a panorama train that connects Zermatt with Davos and St. Moritz. Surrounded by mighty 3000-metre peaks, the region around Goms boasts numerous exciting excursion destinations such as the Swiss Alps Jungfrau-Aletsch UNESCO World Heritage Site. These serene villages are known for their baroque churches and chapels, as well as for the unmistakable architecture of their old wooden houses and barns.

With its elevation of 1300 metres and over 90 kilometres of cross-country ski trails, Goms is one of Switzerland's largest and most snow-sure cross-country skiing areas. Several stops along the Matterhorn-Gotthard railway line provide direct access to a network of cross-country ski trails. Well-known Cross-Country Skiing competitions such as the annual international Gommerlauf are held in Goms.

The Goms Nordic Centre – inaugurated in 2023 – is the centre point of the Goms cross-country ski area and has a state-of-the-art biathlon and cross-country arena. The Cross-Country Skiing World Cup as well as the Biathlon Alpine and Continental Cup are held here. Ideal snow conditions, impressive mountain views on both sides of the valley, and a modern competition infrastructure make Goms the perfect place for Nordic sports competitions. In addition, Goms's topography is ideal for ski orienteering competitions.

2.2 General Information

2.2.1 Rules and Regulations

The 5th CISM Military World Winter Games are organised in accordance with:

- the CISM Statutes
- the CISM Regulations
- the CISM Sports Regulations
- the CISM Military World Winter Games Guidelines
- the CISM Code of Ethics
- the Contract of Organisation for the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games.

Only CISM active member nations have the right to participate in CISM events (CISM Regulations, Article 1.10). The letter of the CISM President (N°2022/029/CISM/PSDT) dated April 1st, 2022 is an integral part of this file. This principle applies to all nations which are sanctioned or subject to action directives by the Swiss Confederation.

2.2.2 Language

All official documents associated with the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games will be published in English.

2.2.3 Programme of stay

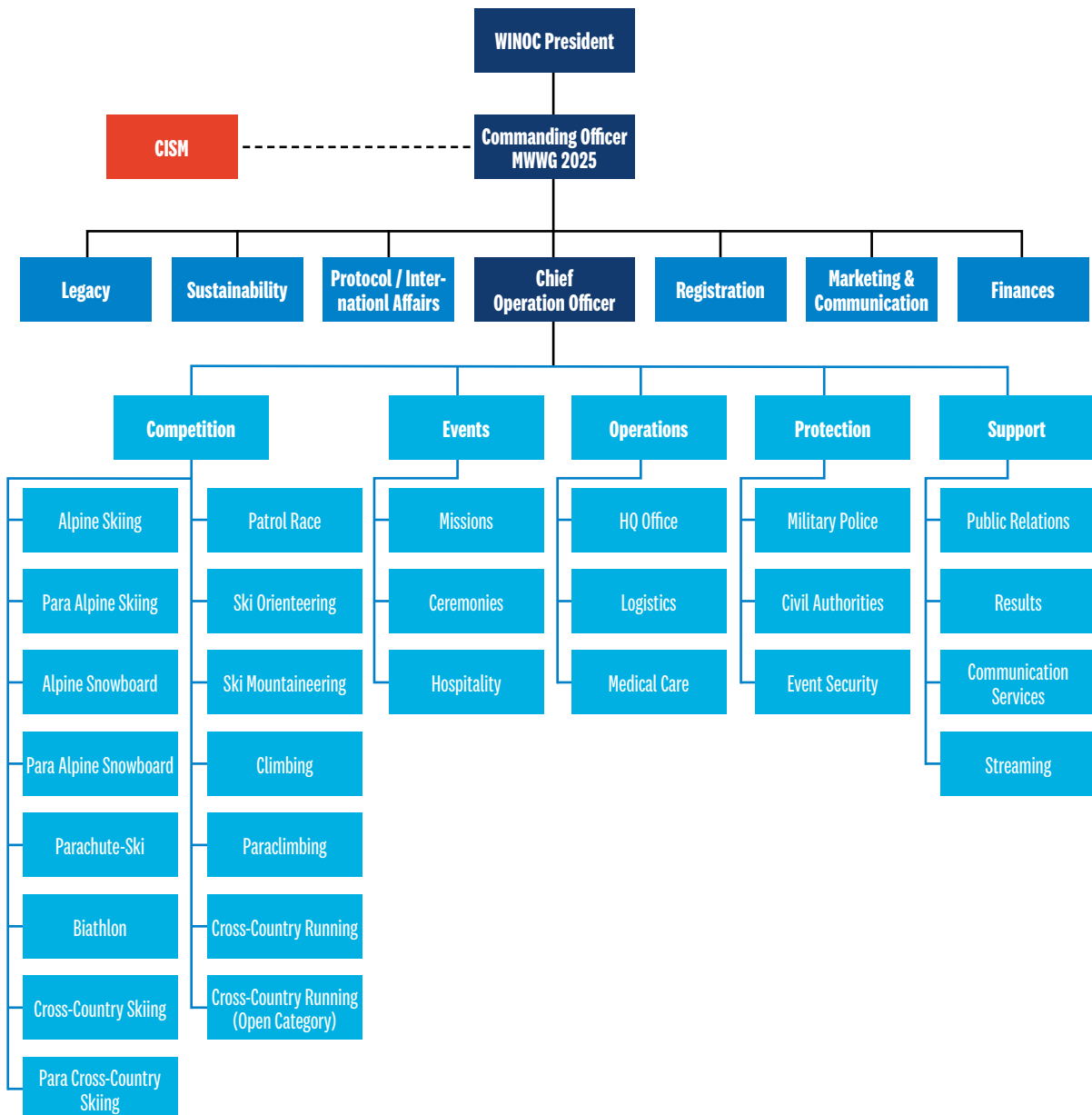
Upon arrival in Switzerland the missions will receive detailed information about:

- the overall programme
- the sports programme including competition and training
- the official meetings
- the opening and closing ceremonies
- the gift exchange (Chief of Mission)
- transportation
- the dress regulations
- the various contact persons
- the rules of stay
- live results and useful links
- medical care.

2.2.4 Military Ranks of the Swiss Armed Forces

An overview of Swiss military ranks including a NATO code comparison will be made available on the official website of the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games.

2.3 WINOC – Organisation



2.4 Participants

2.4.1 Military Status

Athletes participating in the sporting events of the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games must be on full active military duty in the Armed Forces of their respective nations.

Military personnel must document their active military service with either

- a valid military ID card or
- a certification of their military status accompanied by a regular ID card or passport.

Athletes participating in the parasport programme must be veterans or on active duty. For more detailed information about the parasport programme, please refer to the CISM Regulations, Art. 7.23 a/c.

2.4.2 Age Requirement

Service personnel participating in the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games must have turned 18 by the time they enter Switzerland.

2.4.3 Chief of Mission and Deputy Chief of Mission

Each delegation must appoint a Chief of Mission who is empowered to represent their national Armed Forces. The Chief of Mission may not simultaneously act as athlete or coach.

For an appointment of (not more than) one Deputy Chief of Mission the following two conditions must be met:

- the respective mission must be registered with more than 50 participants
- athletes taking part in sporting events at at least two sport venues.



2.4.4 Mission Composition and Quota

Teams sent by their nations to participate in the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games are referred to as missions.

The Mission Composition and Quota was determined by WINOC in accordance with the CISM Regulations, the relevant PCSC's and the respective CISM Sports Regulations.

Delegations are required to strictly respect the Mission Composition and Quota. No additional mission member is allowed.

In case the Mission Composition and Quota is not respected, missions have to organise and cover the additional costs for accommodation, transportation as well as for food and beverages.

2.4.5 Other Individuals

All other individuals such as relatives, friends, etc. are welcome to join the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games, however, they do not receive accreditation like the participants and are simply considered as spectators.

Watching the sporting events at the competition venues is free of charge. The same applies for the opening and closing ceremonies. However, spectators must still obtain a seat ticket (free of charge) in advance on the official websites due to space restrictions.

Visiting supporters are responsible for organising their accommodation, transportation as well as their food and beverages at their own expense.

WINOC does not have any financial or organisational obligations towards individuals who are not included in the missions.



2.4.6 Withdrawal

Any delegation that withdraws from participating in an event for which it had registered in the Final Entry or in the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games after having submitted the Final Entry should notify WINOC in writing at least one month before the opening ceremony with a copy to the CISM Secretary General.

Any nation failing to inform WINOC will be subject to disciplinary action.

2.4.7 Late Replacement, Late Cancellation or Late Addition

After having submitted their Final Entry, delegations are required to inform WINOC of any changes to their mission composition using the Late Replacement online.

Should the delegation fail to inform WINOC before the arrival of the mission in Switzerland, WINOC may refuse the Late Replacement or Late Addition.



2.5 Arrival

2.5.1 General Arrival

The participating missions are expected to arrive at their submitted arrival dates and times. If a mission is divided into several travel groups, the individual travel schedules must be provided in the Final Entry.

Missions arriving in Switzerland will be welcomed by WINOC at their Point of Entry.

Points of Entry:

- By plane: Zurich Airport (ZRH)
- By train: Lucerne Main Station
- By car: Accreditation Centre, Armee- und Ausbildungszentrum (AAL), Murmattweg 6, 6000 Lucerne

Travel expenses from the home country to the Point of Entry are not covered by WINOC.

Luggage labels will be issued to the missions in advance so that transportation from the Point of Entry to the accommodation can be better ensured.

On arrival by plane or by train, the missions will be shuttled to the central accreditation centre in Lucerne, where the Chief of Mission will receive the accreditation for all mission members. Once accreditation has been completed, participants will travel to their respective competition centre or accommodation. Missions arriving by car drive directly to the accreditation centre in Lucerne and then transfer to their respective accommodation or competition centre.

For state guests and persons protected under international law, travel will be organised in accordance with the applicable protocols.

Should missions not wish to make use of the free local transportation, WINOC will not be responsible for any issues and expenses that arise as a result.

2.5.2 Entry to Switzerland / Customs

As Switzerland is part of the Schengen area, visitors from Schengen states do not need a visa to enter the country. Visitors from outside the Schengen area may, depending on their nationality, require a visa to enter Switzerland because of the rules set by the Schengen Agreement. Visa applications are generally handled abroad by the Swiss representation closest to the applicant's place of residence. In addition to the travel documents, applicants must provide a travel health insurance policy and supplementary documents that prove the purpose of the journey.

WINOC will make itself available for any administrative questions on the entry requirements and the import of weapons, ammunition and medical products and will help in these matters wherever possible.

The form for the entry of military personnel into Swiss territory, which must be submitted through diplomatic channels by the participating nation, will be sent to the participating nations by WINOC.

Wearing Uniform

The embassy in Switzerland of each participating country must submit a request to the military protocol section of the Federal Department of Defence in Bern for permission to wear uniforms during the Games.

Weapons and Ammunition

Weapons and ammunition for biathlon will be stored securely at the Nordic Sports Centre in Goms. Weapons and ammunition may not be carried outside the arena apart from when travelling to or from the venue.

2.5.3 Early Arrival of Expected Missions

Missions arriving early are responsible for organising their accommodation, transportation as well as their food and beverages at their own expense.

WINOC will not provide any logistical support to missions arriving early.

2.5.4 Arrival of Unexpected Missions

WINOC will not allow unexpected missions to participate in the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games.

2.6 Departure

2.6.1 General Departure

The missions are expected to depart at their submitted departure dates and times.

If a mission is divided into several travel groups the individual schedules have to be provided in the Final Entry. The missions must leave the accommodation by 08.00 at the latest on the day of departure.

Travel expenses from Switzerland to a mission's home country are not covered by WINOC.

2.6.2 Early Departure

No sanctions will be applicable if an athlete or a mission leaves the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games with the approval of an Official CISM Representative (OCR) and WINOC because of absolute necessity or in case of emergency (e. g., injuries, death of a family member, flight connection problems).

Late Departure

Missions departing later are responsible for organising their accommodation, transportation as well as their food and beverages at their own expense. WINOC does not provide any logistical support to missions departing late.

2.7 Rules of stay

During their stay in Switzerland the missions will be the guests of the Swiss Armed Forces from 23–30 March 2025.



2.7.1 Dress Regulations

Military Uniform

CISM officials, mission and sports officials, as well as all other participants, are to wear their national military uniform at official ceremonies such as the opening and closing ceremony. During the official medal ceremonies, military uniforms are mandatory to emphasise the military character of the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games.

National Sports Uniform

Flower ceremonies follow immediately after a sporting event and will be conducted in national sports uniforms. National sports uniforms must meet the corresponding national criteria, preferably bearing the country's national colours and the name of the country.

2.7.2 Disciplinary Responsibility

Chiefs of Mission are responsible for the behaviour and discipline of their mission – in sports and in general. The missions fall under the jurisdiction of the Swiss Confederation.

All athletes participating in the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games are equal before the jury, the referees and to themselves. No one may use their rank to impose their views on sporting matters.

Civilian members of the missions will abide by the rules applicable to all other participants.

2.7.3 Forbidden Actions

In conformity with CISM Statutes and Regulations, the dissemination of any political or religious propaganda during the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games, in

particular of documents, pictures, brochures, reviews, etc. is strictly forbidden. Advertising weapons, alcohol and/or tobacco products is prohibited categorically.

Unethical advertising or advertising that discredits the spirit of CISM or sport in general is strictly forbidden.

Any contravention of these rules may result in the exclusion of the respective participant or the whole mission from further competition and may result in additional sanctions.

CISM and WINOC have zero tolerance for

- all forms of harassment including sexual harassment and sexual assault and/or
- any kind of discrimination against any country or individual on the grounds of ethnicity, religious belief, political orientation or gender and/or
- Anti-doping rule violations.

All allegations of harassment and discrimination will be investigated swiftly and thoroughly and appropriate sanctions imposed.

2.8 Accommodation, food and beverages

2.8.1 General Accommodation

To avoid long journeys, accommodation areas are located near the competition venues.

Support staff will be accommodated close to the athletes.

Please note that VVIPs, VIPs and CISM officials will be accommodated separately according to their function and sport.

2.8.3 Food and Beverages

WINOC will provide food and non-alcoholic beverages throughout the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games. Additional food and beverages must be arranged at participants' own expense.

The meals provided will be healthy and nutritious. Vegetarian dishes will also be offered with every meal. According to the Swiss law, halal meat cannot be provided. There will be alternatives meeting halal standards.

2.8.4 Additional Expenses

Missions and participants are expected to cover their personal expenses (e. g., telephone calls, laundry, additional food and beverages).

2.9 Transportation

During the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games WINOC will provide participants with free local transport according to their function.

Dedicated cars with driver will be available to:

- VVIP
- CISM President
- CISM Vice Presidents
- CISM Secretary General
- OCR
- Chief of Mission

Timetables for shuttle buses and public transport will be published well in advance and can be found at the info point or online.

In designing its transport concept and in choosing means of transport, WINOC has taken sustainability considerations into account. Switzerland's public transport network is one of the best in the world. All competition and event venues, as well as nearby tourist destinations, are easily accessible by public transport. Public transport and alternative fuel vehicles are therefore used wherever possible.

Shuttle services and free use of public transport (in the event region) are available to all accredited participants of the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games.

2.10 Opening and closing ceremony

The opening and closing ceremonies of the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games will be indoor events taking place at the Messe Lucerne.

2.11 Medical care and health insurance

For the duration of the Games, WINOC will provide an around the clock first aid and evacuation service at all event venues.

Since Switzerland has no military hospitals, WINOC will make use of private medical facilities if the need arises. Therefore, participants do need insurance and must cover the costs themselves.

2.12 Safety and security

During the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games WINOC is responsible for the safety and security of all participants – at event venues as well as at accommodation and during official transport. Any necessary measures will be taken by the Armed Forces' military police, in close cooperation with civilian security authorities.



2.13 Cultural programme

There will be no accompanied cultural activities. WINOC will provide a range of possible activities, expenses must be paid by the participants themselves.

WINOC will also allow accredited athletes to visit other competition sites where they themselves do not compete.



2.14 Event website / Wi-Fi

2.14.1 Event website

2.14.2 Wi-Fi

During the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games, WINOC will provide free Wi-Fi at the accommodation areas and at most competition venues.

2.15 Media support

WINOC will provide infrastructure for all accredited media personnel during the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games.

To ensure media coverage, mixed zones and dedicated media areas will be set up at all competition venues.

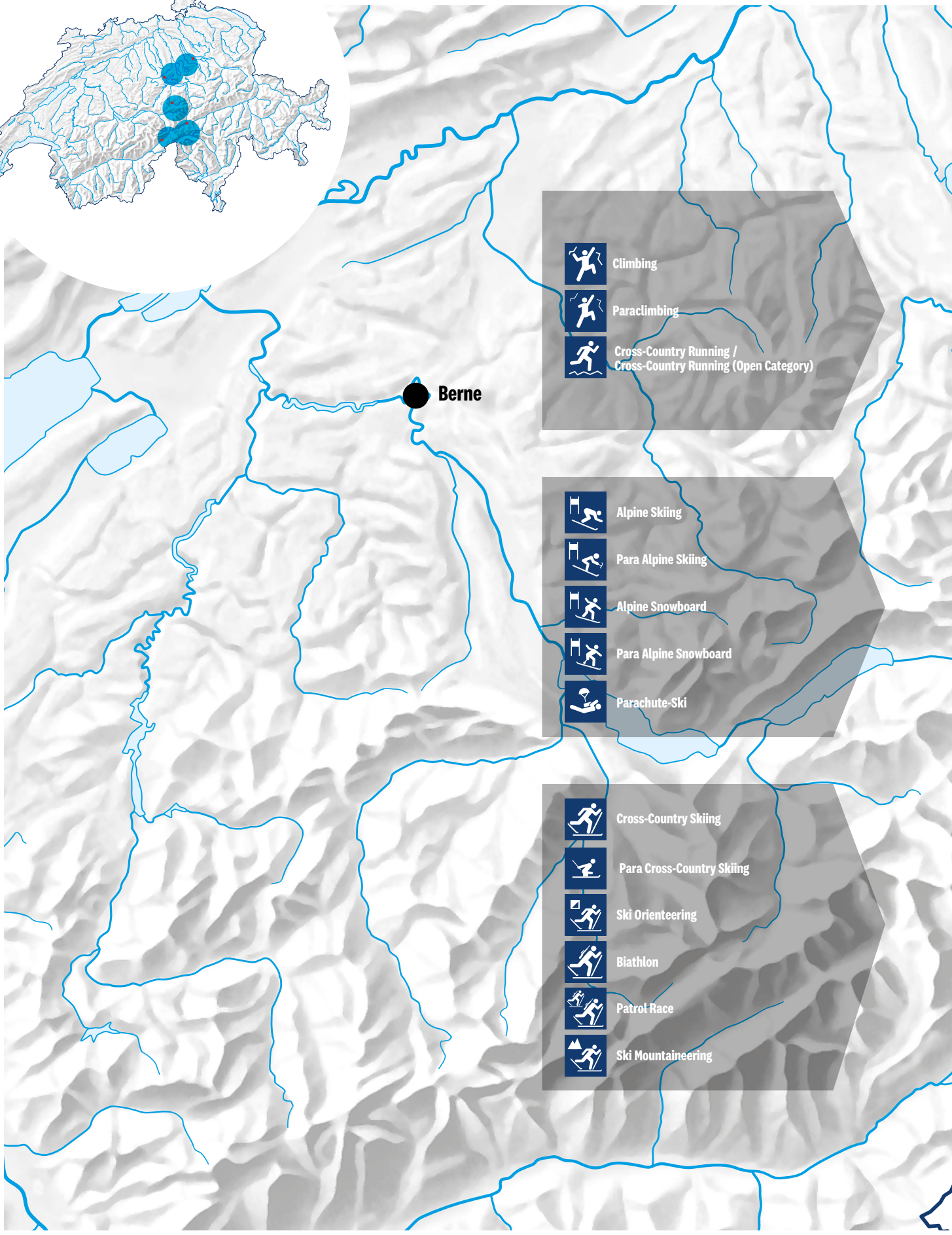
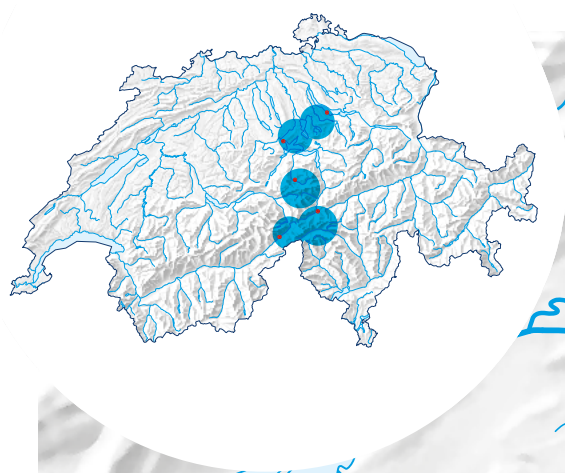

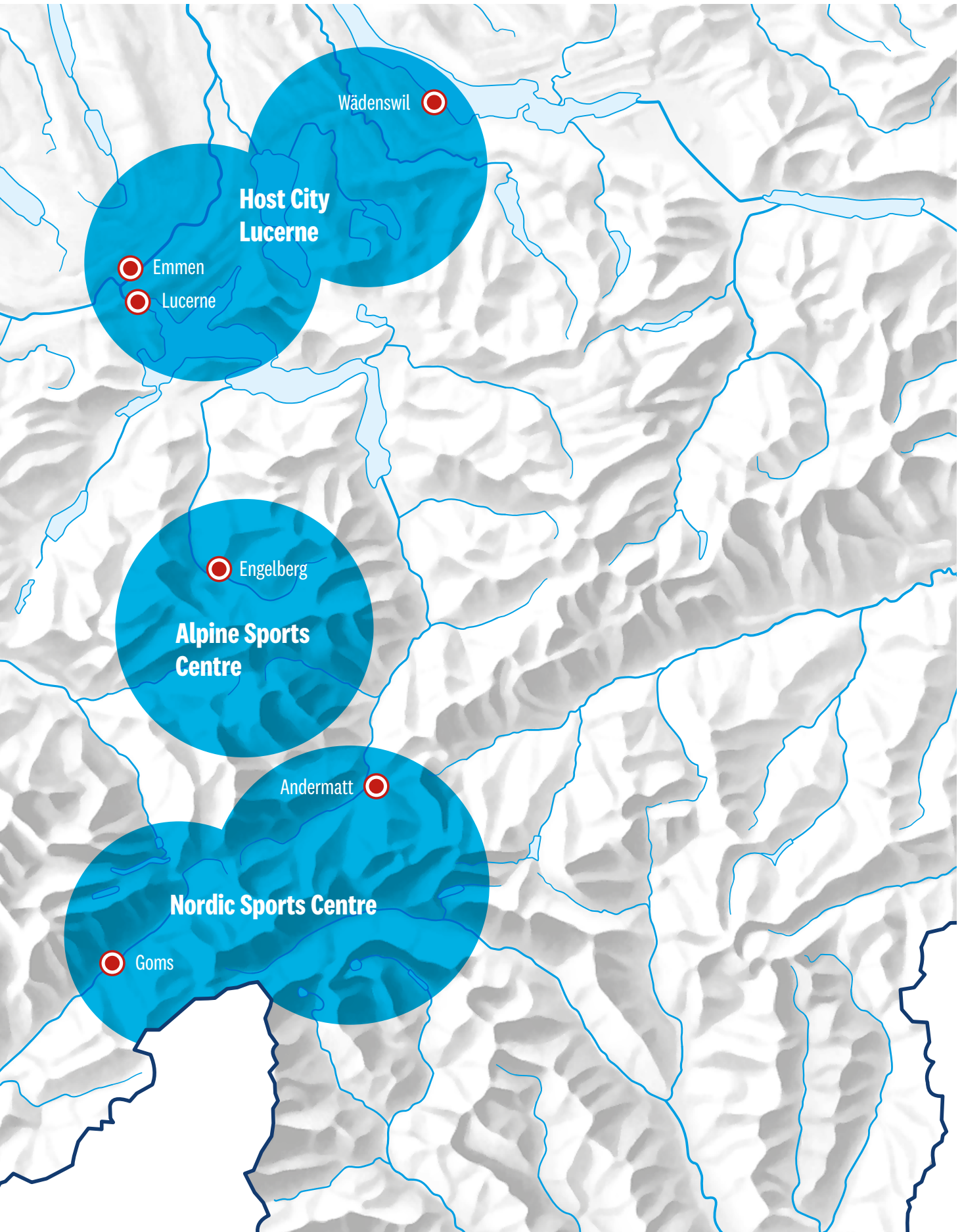

3.3 Sports Bodies

3.3.1 Official CISM Representative

Several members of the CISM Board of Directors (BoD) will assist and support the CISM President in his official mission for the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games in the function as an Official CISM Representative (OCR).

An OCR may not simultaneously act as Chief of Mission.

Besides protocol-discipline and information the responsibility of an OCR mainly includes important sports matters such as chairing the Jury of Appeal and the Anti-Doping Commission.

3.3.2 CISM Sport Committee

CISM Sport Committees (CSC) are generally responsible for the management, development and technical aspects of their sport competitions.

During the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games the CSC Members, mainly the Presidents of the CISM Sport Committees (PCSC), supervise the technical conduct of the specific sport events.

3.3.3 Technical Jury

A Technical Jury will be established for each sport during the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games.

During the Preliminary Meeting the responsible PCSC will appoint the president and the members of the Technical Jury.

The Technical Jury is responsible for reviewing competition venues, ensuring compliance with the technical regulations and controlling as well as determining the competition results.

3.3.4 Jury of Appeal

A Jury of Appeal will be established for the duration of the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games.

The Jury of Appeal is appointed during the Preliminary Meeting and is composed of an OCR acting as president and three members who are chosen from among the delegates of the participating missions. The Jury of Appeal handles protests and makes final decisions.

3.3.5 Anti-Doping Commission

An Anti-Doping Commission will be set up for the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games.

The Commission is composed of:

- an OCR acting as president
- the respective PCSC acting as technical advisor to the OCR
- a representative of WINOC.

The Anti-Doping Commission is responsible for the organisation and conduct of tests during the Games.



3.4 Official meetings

To ensure the sound organisation of the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games the following meetings will take place:

- Preliminary Meeting
- Technical Meetings
- Meetings of the CISM Sport Committees
- Meetings of the Technical Jury
- Meetings of the Jury of Appeal
- Meetings of the Anti-Doping Commission

The composition and agenda of the official meetings are specified in the CISM Regulations. Time and place of the meetings will be announced on site.

3.5 Start and results lists

Immediately after the Technical Meetings the start lists for the sport events will be published on the official website of the 5th CISM Military World Winter Games.

The result lists can be found on the official website after the competitions.

3.6 Awards

The 5th CISM Military World Winter Games awards include:

- official CISM medals
- official CISM certificates
- overall best nation award
- fairplay trophy.



3.7 Parasports competitions

Parasport competitions will be offered for athletes with physical disabilities in the sports of Alpine Skiing, Alpine Snowboard, Cross-Country Skiing and Climbing. Cross-Country Running competitions will be offered for athletes with mental health impairments (e.g. Operational Stress Injury OSI).

Participating athletes will be classified and validated by an official classifier of the International Paralympic Committee (IPC). Athletes competing in the Open Category (Cross-Country Running) will not be classified.

WINOC does not provide any material. Athletes competing in parasport categories must bring their own equipment.

3.8 Anti-doping regulations

Doping, as defined and addressed in the current CISM Regulations and Anti-Doping Rules, is forbidden.

The CISM anti-doping policy follows:

- the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) regulations
- the International Sport Federations' regulations
- the CISM Regulations
- the CISM Sports Regulations
- the CISM Anti-Doping Rules
- the Annual CISM Anti-Doping Tests Distribution Plan (TDP).

The CISM anti-doping policy is under the shared responsibility of the following four bodies:

- Secretary General (Anti-Doping Manager)
- Anti-Doping Commission
- TUE Commission
- Discipline Commission

Each athlete participating in the 5th CISM World Winter Games should be familiar with the latest version of the World Anti-Doping Code and the Prohibited Substances List. Furthermore, athletes have to be available for sample collection at all times.

Doping controls will be carried out in all sports. The mandatory number of controls is stipulated in the Testing Distribution Plan. Sample analysis will be performed at a WADA-accredited laboratory.

If an athlete needs to use prohibited substances or methods on medical reasons, they must obtain a Therapeutic Use Exemptions (TUE). CISM automatically recognises TUEs from other anti-doping organisations, but will still review the TUE and might ask the athlete for further information. If an athlete does not have a valid TUE, they must complete the TUE application process and the TUE must be granted by the TUE Commission. The TUE Application Form must be sent to the CISM Anti-Doping Manager 30 days before the opening ceremony.

3.9 Protests

Protests be submitted to the President of the Technical Jury in writing and be signed by the Chief of Mission or Team Captain .

A deposit of EUR 100 is payable for each protest.

The Technical Jury will decide on a protest in accordance with the CISM Sports Regulations and/or the International Sports Federations' regulations.

If a mission is not satisfied with the decision reached by the Technical Jury, the Chief of Mission or Team Captain can submit a further protest in writing to the Jury of Appeal, which will then make a final decision.



4 REGISTRATION





4.1 Registration process

Registration for the event will be conducted exclusively online via an application. Registrations via email will not be accepted.

4.1.1 Registration Phases and Deadlines

The deadlines are as follows:

- 1st Preliminary Agreement: 31 May 2024
- 2nd Preliminary Agreement: 30 September 2024
- Final Entry: 31 January 2025
- Late Replacement: 12 March 2025



The registration deadlines must be strictly respected, late registrations cannot be accepted due to the extensive preparatory work of the Organising Committee for this multisport event.

CISM delegations must declare their interest in participating at the event by completing the 1st Preliminary Agreement by 31 May 2024 (mandatory). Should the 1st Preliminary Agreement not be submitted in time, the Organising Committee will refuse the respective nations to participate.

4.1.2 Online Registration

CISM nations will receive an invitation code which will be sent to their official email addresses listed at the CISM HQ.

Important information:

1. Please check the spam folder of your inbox. As the invitation codes are generated automatically, the mails may be moved to the spam folder.
2. A CH-Login account must be created to access the event registration site. Detailed instructions will be provided before the start of registration. If you created an account for the CISM World Military Half-Marathon Championships 2023 or other CISM events in Switzerland, you can use your existing account.
3. Only one account per nation is permitted. Once an individual has redeemed the invitation code, no other person can use the code to enter the registration website.
4. Two-factor authentication is required for login either via authenticator app or SMS. We strongly recommend using an authenticator app (e. g. Microsoft Authenticator), as sending an SMS to international numbers is not guaranteed in all cases.
5. Please register via a computer. The registration website is compatible with mobile devices, but it is easier to use a computer.

4.9 Late Replacement

After the Final Entry phase has been closed, nations will still be able to access the registration website and enter any changes that may occur. This allows them, for example, to replace injured athletes, to correct incorrect data or update travel details.

The registration of additional participants is possible, but has to be checked and approved by the Organising Committee. Nations can request to include additional participants directly in the registration application.

Participating nations have to make sure that all registration information is correct and up to date by 12 March 2025. This is very important to guarantee a fast check-in procedure on arrival at the event. All changes after 12 March 2025 have to be checked and entered on arrival at the Troubleshooting Desk.

4.10 Commitment of the Chief of Delegation

Every Chief of Delegation has to declare that:

- all officials and athletes who are members of the mission possess appropriate sports technical expertise,
- all athletes who are members of the mission are on full active military duty in the nation's Armed Forces (or veterans for athletes participating in the parasports programme),
- all athletes competing in an Open Category event meet the requirements for their participation (Operational Stress Injury (OSI) or other mental health impairment),
- the Chief of Mission and all other members of the mission have been informed of the Regulations and traditions of CISM, including the importance of fair play and good behaviour,
- during the Games, the Chief of Mission is responsible for the behaviour and discipline of the mission members – in sports and in general,
- all information provided in the Final Entry is complete and correct.

The commitment of the Chief of Delegation has to be signed and submitted online in the Final Entry.
